This is an in-depth course in the history of art and culture, as well as in the history of public art with an interdisciplinary approach. It presupposes and utilizes knowledge and skills acquired from attending undergraduate courses on:

- History of art
- History of civilizations
- Public history
- Social and cultural history of the city
- Culture policies, cultural heritage, and space
- Cultural topography

The course material directs students to deeply understand, apply and judge issues of

history, theory and methodology, focusing on the ways in which art in public space gives meaning to and interacts with urban residential formations over time. Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able:

- to understand the cultural construction of a city's public space and the ways in which it can be disrupted through works of art,
- to understand the correlation of sensations and emotions with material representations in the urban landscape,
- to interpret the possibility of a work of art in the public space (installation, monument, other performance) to influence and shape social practices and relationships,
- to realize that public interventions often generate conflicting interpretations of a society's past depending on the historical circumstances, causing transformations of time, place, and human behaviours,
- to think about the ways in which space in its various versions and at various scales, as well as works of art, become crucial conditions for the formation of individual and collective memory and
- to understand that the interaction of individuals and collectives with the space is not only an intellectual relationship but first a physical relationship in which the senses and emotions are mobilized.

(3) SYLLABUS

The aim of the course is to highlight the complex and multi-layered relationship

between art and public space by examining performative practices, commemorative rituals, traumatic and divisive experiences, visual installations, and monuments, created by various agencies and collective actors, aiming to intervene and shape public stories and narratives. Within this process our interest is focused on the material representations of history, memory, identities, publics, as well as the contestations and exclusions of groups and collectives. At the same time, the ways through which public art can involve citizens in a dynamic relationship with the urban environment are examined. The form, content, extent and topography of the visual installations and performances, the temporality and spatiality of the actions, are key points of study for the understanding of all the above.
